Stem terete, simple below, much branched above, 1-5 ft. long. Lower leaves semi-amplexicaul, longitudinally involute, broadest at the base, tapering gradually to the apex, many-ribbed, with coarse often prominent ascending reticulations. Upper leaves coriaceous, lanceolate, elliptical, oval, or spatulate, with flattened petioles equalling or exceeding the lamina, produced singly opposite, or in pairs subtending, the peduncles, abundant on both flowering and barren branches. Stipules persistent, involute, herbaceous or horny, blunt. Peduncles equal, often curved, shorter than the subtending leaves. Flower-spike short, abortive, usually with closed, rarely with open, flowers. Fruit imperfect, compressed, keeled. Whole plant dark green, often with reddish stems. Probably a hybrid between *P. heterophyllus* and *P. perfoliatus*, or between the latter and *P. Zizii*? This Pontamogeton grows abundantly in Blackbush Drain and some adjacent ditches near Whittlesea, Cambridgeshire. It is distinguished from all other forms of *P. nitens* hitherto described by its involute stem-leaves, and by its very freely produced coriaceous floating...



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
